


2024 DATA IN REVIEW

We believe in data. The Williams Institute remains committed to rigorous, independent research on sexual orientation and gender identity. For more than two decades, we have supplied policymakers with facts illuminating the impact of law and policy on the lives of LGBTQ people. 2024 was no different. In a year marked both by support for LGBTQ people by the federal government and opposition to transgender rights by state legislatures, the Williams Institute's research highlights the impact of laws and policies on LGBTQ people. Take a look at how our groundbreaking findings relate to the most significant developments in LGBTQ law and policy this year.

56,000 transgender youth live in states with policies that may restrict their access to bathrooms and facilities.



March

Alabama enacts a law banning state funding for DEI programs at public universities and limits teaching "divisive concepts" of race and gender.

April

After 25 years, the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission issues new guidelines explicitly protecting LGBTQ people from workplace harassment.

June

▶ This month marks the warmest June on record across the planet in the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's 175-year history.




of LGBTQ+ college faculty surveyed have explored moving to another state because of anti-DEI laws, and 23% have actively taken steps to do so.





Reported experiences of harassment





August


 A Chinese court grants parental visiting rights to a woman who separated from her wife, legally recognizing a child has two mothers for the first time.

November

 Sarah McBride wins Delaware's only U.S. House of Representatives seat, becoming the first transgender person elected to Congress. Voters in California, Colorado, and Hawaii approve ballot measures codifying marriage equality in their state constitutions.

December

► The Supreme Court hears oral arguments in *U.S. v. Skrmetti* to determine if Tennessee's ban on gender-affirming care is constitutional.

TRANS VOTER ID


An estimated **825,100**

transgender adult citizens

were eligible to vote in the November 2024 election



58% of them do not have an ID with their correct name and gender.



210,800 transgender adults without accurate IDs live in 33 states that conduct their elections in person and have voter ID laws.

91,300 transgender voters without accurate IDs live in 10 states with the strictest voter ID laws.
